- ✓ Students appreciate being given responsibility for learning and opportunities for extending learning and they have many opportunities to be involved in leadership and extended ad applied learning activities.
- ✓ Our students are confident, polite and courteous to visitors and each other.
- ✓ Students work hard with the school to prevent all forms of bullying-they know how to report and seek help and support should they feel the need to report something.

- ✓ Students are safe and feel safe at all times. They understand how to keep themselves and other safe outside of school and the school has a dedicated and timetabled PSHCE programme to address relevant local issues.

### **TOP OF THE BENCH**

On the 16<sup>th</sup> November four budding Chemists from years 9 to 11 took part in the Royal Society of Chemistry's annual 'Top of the Bench' competition.

Fred, Jamilah, Harry and Eleanor had the task of completing a poster, the theme of which was Chemistry in our area, prior to the competition date, which they then presented on arrival at the competition.

The competition day saw Jamilah, Harry, Eleanor and Fred battle it out against other schools from across the Wirral and Cheshire areas. A Chemistry practical test involving great skill, knowledge and team work was completed with 100% accuracy, alongside Chemistry based test on key areas of the Chemistry curriculum.

The overall outcome for the day was fantastic; Harry, Eleanor, Fred and Jamilah saw their hard work pay off gaining the winners position for the Wirral heat and coming away with their own prizes and certificates.

This is a great achievement in itself, as we as a school have not been overall heat winners in previous years of attending the competition. Our excitement continued on the 3<sup>rd</sup> of December when we received notification the Eleanor, Fred, Jamilah and Harry had been the top scoring team in the three North West qualifying heats and have been put through to attend the National Finals of the 'Top of the Bench' competition to be held in March 2019 at Birmingham University.

A massive well done to Fred, Jamilah, Harry and Eleanor and a great way to end 2018 in Science.

### **River Alyn**

Our classes began our journey by getting on a big bus. We were on our way to the River Alyn where we were going to different stages of the river to measure depth, width, speed, rock size and rock shape. When we got to our first destination we got split into groups of about 5 then collected the equipment we needed and made our way down to the river. Once at the river each group spread out along it and started their investigation. Our first part of the river was high up in the upper course where the water was shallowest.

The first thing each group had to do was measure the channel width. Using a tape measure one person from my group held one end at the point where the water meets the bank one side of the channel. Ensuring the tape wasn't twisted another person went to the other side of the river and measured to the point where the water meets the bank directly opposite. We would write our results down in our booklets.

The second thing my group did was measure channel depth. There would have been some variation in channel depth across the river so it would not be representative to take a single measurement of depth.



So instead we took a number of measurements. How many measurements you would take would depend on the variability of the channel depth and width of the river channel. We divided the width by ten. E.g. Width 1.20m 1.20/10= 0.12m or 12cm. Using this to measure at 9 equally spaced points across the channel. With a metre ruler we measured from the water surface to the river bed. To ensure accuracy we turned the metre ruler so that the narrow side of the ruler faces into the flow of the river. For each result there was a space in the booklet to write our number down.

The third thing my group did was measure velocity. Using a floating item such as dog biscuits, we could calculate the velocity using the formula Velocity = Distance/Time linking Maths into our Geography lessons. We would write our results in the booklet.

### First you:

- > Measure out 5 metres downstream.
- ➤ Place the floating item in the water at the upstream end.
- > Start timing when you let go of the floating item.
- ➤ When it reached the end of the measured stretch we stopped timing.
- ➤ We then repeated it three times and calculated the mean time (Maths again in a Geography lesson?!?!).

We also measured the velocity using a flowmeter which is basically a stick with an impellor on which turns as the water

flows past.



After we finished all the methods above at the location, we packed our equipment up and went to two other parts of the River Alyn where we repeated the same process and each destination. As we went further down the river through the upper course to the upper part of the middle course, the river got deeper and wider and the shape and size of the rocks got more eroded and rounded.

After we finished at all three locations and we had collected all the results we needed, we got back on the bus and went back to school.

It was a really enjoyable trip and we learnt a lot to help us embed our understanding of the topic learnt in class.


