Dear Parents and Guardians.



The excitement, optimism and sense of challenge with which we start this new school year is one that I hope all members of the school will relish and enjoy.



### **EPCHS ALUMNI**

The start of my day, every day of the working week, for seven years. Walking through the gates and heading to form, before my five daily lessons and heading home at 15:00; this is a simplified version of an **EPCHS** day for me and put like this, it seems boring, uninspiring and never ending. However, by making the most of each opportunity offered to you, you can shape your high school experiences and use them as stepping stones on your unique pathway to success. September 2018 saw me move south to Exeter, where I'm currently studying History with French moving away from home and learning to live with complete strangers was a challenge for sure, but we were all in the same boat, so by embracing the situation we were able to overcome our initial anxieties. Fortunately, we became the best of friends very quickly, as well as with people in other blocks.

Although very different from the 9-3 of EPCHS, university study has built upon the skills I'd already learned, as well as teaching me how to write academically, effectively manage my time and be motivated to work independently. One of the best aspects of uni life though is the availability of even more career guidance, as well as opportunities to improve your CV. In just my first year, I was able to take part in two London teaching internships, as well as attending various employer presentations to help me decide my future pathways post-graduation. I've also been able to represent the University at a Model United Nations conference in Switzerland, which was a fabulous week of learning and making the most of Swiss hospitality. We were quite literally thrown in the deep end, having received no preparatory resources before the conference, so were disadvantaged compared to the other candidates, but as a team, we worked hard to research the topics and debating styles so we could be up to date.



The opportunity to work for Camp America was also advertised during my first year, and after watching a presentation in Bristol, my summer trip was decided! I had to be 'interviewed' (in Costa with cake!!) and I opted to go to a recruitment fair before I was placed. For 9 weeks this summer, I was working as a lifeguard and swim teacher at a summer camp in upstate New York, just 90 minutes from the Big Apple. Not only did I become great friends with some of the other counselors and staff, but it was brilliant to develop special relationships with the young people, who really look up to you as their role models. I'm biased but there's nowhere more that this happened than in the pool, where we saw the amazing progress of the campers throughout the summer. One girl in particular, was 6 years old and couldn't swim in the first week, but by the last, she was swimming in the deep end with the biggest smile ever! It's moments like this that made the experience completely worthwhile. After camp, I was also able to travel all across the States with a new group of people for three weeks; it was as fun and as crazy as you can imagine! From the start, we all got on really well, which helped during the long drives, and we were able to enjoy places like Washington, New Orleans, Santa Fe, Las Vegas and Yosemite. It will certainly take a lot to beat!

With time having flown by scarily quickly, I'm back in Exeter for my second year, and already halfway through term 1. I'm excited to see what opportunities this year will bring, as we prepare for our year abroad in France, as well as practicing dissertation techniques in History. My current module in History is very similar to our A Level course, so it's been great(!) to revisit the world of the Reformation, albeit from a different perspective. Whilst university is primarily sold as a place to further your academic ability, get a degree to get a well-paid job, I'd say that it also provides, to almost an equal level, key life skills that you can't really learn elsewhere; had I not moved to Exeter, I wouldn't have had to learn how to deal with utility companies or renting a house, for example. One also learns that groceries can be surprisingly expensive and that you have to become inventive in times of financial difficulty!! It is these life skills, however, that make you ready for adult life and accompanying all the academic enrichment offered, university life, I believe, does set you up for a well-rounded future. - Mark (EPCHS Leaver 2018)














### Year 8 Invade Wepre Park!

"My favourite part was the walk because I liked to be able to look down on the river and see the different features we'd learned about in class. It was also very peaceful. Thank you for an enjoyable learning day out."



Their first unit looks at Rivers and the students were asked to investigate how the features of Wepre Brook would change downstream. By focusing on the rivers width, depth, velocity and bed load, students gathered data at two key points, putting into practice the theories they had learnt in class. Using a range of equipment from flow meters to vernier calipers the students worked well, recording the data ready to be used back in the classroom.





As part of the day students took part in a walk up to the historical site where King Henry II had been ambushed by Owain the Great at the foot of Ewloe Castle. Students also learnt how Wepre Park is used by a wide range of people, who come in the main to enjoy its tranquil trails whilst also being home to the second toughest 5KM Park Run in the UK.

The students behaviour and attitude to the fieldwork was exemplary, with members of the public commenting to staff present what, a credit they were to our school - Miss Johnson.
