

CONGRATULATIONS Conon Niall!

On Monday 17th October Fr Niall Mullaley – Parish priest for Our Lady's Ellesmere Port – was inducted into Shrewsbury Diocese's Chapter of Canons. Thus Fr Niall, now Canon Niall, has been recognised by Bishop Mark for his years of service and superlative work.

Though historically the Chapter of Canon's traditionally discussed and informed Church leaders of authentic Catholic doctrinal practise, the role was reduced following the second ecumenical council of the Vatican (1962-65). This vocation now requires Canon's to place a yet more profound focus on prayer and service within their ministry. Perhaps a Canon's most privileged role within modern Catholicism is the relevant Chapter's assemblage when discerning, and presenting to the pope, an appropriate successor following the retirement or death of a bishop.

NOVEMBER A MONTH OF REMEMBRANCE

As the Catholic Church distinguishes the month of November as a period of remembrance and prayer for the souls our deceased brothers and sisters, our school observed this special month of commemoration in a number of pertinent ways.

Firstly, we encouraged students and staff members to place names of deceased loves ones into our school's Remembrance Book. This book was then placed in a prominent position within our chapel, and/displayed during weekly year group Mass'. Furthermore, it was prayed over daily by school chaplains – Ant and Pat – and by members of our student '10:10' chaplaincy team.

During the lead up to Remembrance Sunday, and Remembrance Day (11/11), our History staff informed students (via assemblies) of the distinct significance of our nation's annual Remembrance traditions. Also, members of our Art and Design Technology departments beautifully decorated the Main Hall and front of school with Remembrance Day displays. Our school Chaplain Pat, organised a touching Remembrance Day service in the chapel. In attendance were student members representing each Form Group across all year groups, as well as a number of available teaching staff.

FLYING HIGH WITH THE RAF CADETS

When I joined the RAF Air Cadets at the age of 12 I had no idea what opportunities were in store. It's a serious commitment to be a cadet - but once you've experienced it you wouldn't have it any other way. Now at the age of 18 I am a Flight Sergeant at 1123 Hooton Park Squadron and have been on an abundance of adventurous training camps, courses and a trip overseas to RAF Akrotiri in Cyprus. I have also completed

BTEC qualifications in Aviation studies, Leadership and Instructional skills. The pinnacle of my Cadet career was completing the ACPS (Air Cadet Pilot Scholarship) in Dundee two weeks ago. The concentrated flying programme was over two weeks and culminated in a solo flight in a light aircraft on the last day. I would like to thank school for supporting me in allowing the time off to complete the course. I was very lucky to achieve the solo flight as the pass rate is only 25%. This was a fantastic experience and one I will never forget. I managed to fly most days despite the Scottish weather and learnt basic airmanship and lots of safety procedures, including how to recover from a stall at 5,000 feet. On one day luckily I managed to complete 14 'touch and go' training procedures which really helped consolidate my training. As a cadet you'll have

the opportunity to do things that others only dream about. If you are up for fun, adventure, incredible experiences and making new friends and most of all to give you the edge in life then join the RAF Air Cadets. The sky is quite literally the limit.
