
# If you enjoyed reading 'Storm Catchers'...


Soon, following her map, her heart and an ancient myth, Isabella discovers the true end of her journey: to save the island itself.



Lily decides to cross the wire into the danger zone to look for Tips herself...


For Peter, the war is a long way away, being fought by a faceless enemy, marching across places he's never seen.



As the weeks pass by Tom begins to worry when William doesn't answer his letters, so he goes to London to find him, and there makes a terrible discovery.



A breath-taking novel about chosen families and the healing power of love.







Part of the Usborne Young Reader series, this is a spine-chilling retelling of Robert Louis Stevenson's classic story.





Six terrifying tales to unsettle and disturb the mind are powerfully retold in this collection of classic chillers from the Victorian Age.


